The decision to merge the Elizabethtown-Lewis and Westport school districts passed by a significant margin on the evening of December 4, 2018 . This news comes to most as bittersweet, seeing the end of our beloved Westport Central School as it merges with Elizabethtown-Lewis Central School. Just hours after the merge went through, Westport students grouped together to organize an unofficial Westport Pride

Day where students showed off their blue and white in celebration of the history of Westport, as well as to "pay respects" to the school we have lost.
