who were able to share what they had written to their group. Many of the students shared their works. The workshops were safe zones, allowing the students to feel comfortable and unjudged in their environment.

The Listen Festival was a fantastic opportunity for young adults to become aware of their rights as an individual to speak out against situations that they are not comfortable with and to encourage healthy relationships. It is a privilege to live in a country where we have these resources who are so passionate about helping others regardless of our history.
